Dear Friends and Partners,

The thought of being able to go home to the Central African Republic for Christmas is truly exciting, yet it causes me to pause and ponder a bit. Julie and I have been living in the U.S. since 1994, where we have established roots by God's grace.

For the past 28 years, one thing or another has prevented my family from joining our relatives in Africa to celebrate Christmas.

Julie and I are both natives of the Central African Republic (C.A.R.) – which is about the size of Texas – with a population of a little over 5 million people.

Plagued by violence

It is a landlocked nation in the middle of the African continent and is considered one of the poorest countries in the world. A civil war has been going on there since 2012, resulting in hundreds of people killed – including one of my brothers-in-law – when radical Muslim groups began raiding villages and seizing towns. However, violence has plagued the nation for decades, and the economy has suffered dramatically.



Almost 3 million people in the C.A.R. need humanitarian assistance and 45% are food insecure.

As a result, it is estimated that more than 70 percent of the population live in poverty.

While all that information is heartbreaking, my strongest desire is for the spiritual revival of this amazing nation. I long to see my brothers and sisters across this country lean deeply into Jesus Christ in all their earthly interactions.

Although rebuilding after all these tragedies could be done without God, it would simply be a temporary fix. These precious folks have experienced unimaginable trauma, which has left such deep-seated scars in their hearts. Tragedy has a way of changing us for the better or worse.
