I first went to Uganda in the spring of 2018 and again during Christmas break in 2019. Both trips were really enjoyable and made a big impact in my life. I look forward to going back in the future.

A mission trip makes you realize that "it is more blessed to give than to receive." And for me, this realization led to a passion for generous giving because I experienced the joy it gave others. It made me happy to make others happy — whether giving toys to babies at a hospital, handing out shoes to kids in need or seeing my donated books stock a library for eager students. The look on the recipients' faces was rewarding.

Going on a mission trip also broadened my perspective. Uganda was the first time I traveled to another continent, and it was full of new experiences — driving through mostly unmarked streets bursting with sellers and vehicles, seeing the porridge-like meal that kids in orphanages were served, walking into one-room aluminum homes, and witnessing children as young as 3 or 4 retrieve water for their family.

My family and I stayed in one of Uganda's nicest hotels, but it was average by American standards. I came to understand the extraordinary comfort we enjoy in America in a way I wouldn't have by merely hearing or watching videos about impoverished places.

And the binding power of these connections comes from a love for God. Going on mission trips to other countries gives a person the chance to build relationships with other children of God. Of course, these are the most lasting of all bonds. Even though you may be in a foreign nation, around other brothers and sisters in Christ, you can experience Ephesians 2:19: "So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God."

I couldn't possibly list all the benefits of mission trips. And it *is* conceivable to go to a needy place and return home and act as if you had not witnessed extreme poverty and brokenness.
